- The establishment of an interagency mechanism involving relevant stakeholders
- The enhancement of the victim response and support procedures of lawenforcement and frontline services
- The strengthening of the skills of law-enforcement and frontline professionals on rape / sexual violence issues and gender-sensitive victim support

The project will enhance the access of victims and survivors of sexual violence to specialist support tailored to their needs.

- Mapping of all relevant stakeholders
- Development of a Cooperation Protocol and set up of an interagency cooperation/response mechanism
- Development of Protocol/set of gender-sensitive Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs) for law-enforcement's professionals
- Development of Protocol/set of gender-sensitive SOPs for healthcare services
- Development of Guidelines for setting up rape / sexual violence referral structures for providing holistic and comprehensive support to victims of sexual violence
- Development of e-learning platform
- Implementation of Capacity Building Programme
- Creation of information mobile application
- Online awareness raising campaign
